Frankford Gives 'em a Fighting Chance

The Frankford Forward meeting on October 3rd was turned over to the folks from Temple University Hospital for unique kind of First Aid training.

Scott Charles, Temple University Hospital's Trauma Outreach Coordinator, and Tim Bryan, Director of Emergency Medical Services, worked with Wayne Jacobs (Director of the Recidivism-prevention Program X-Offenders for Community Empowerment) to develop Fighting Chance—a two-hour, first-aid class that focuses on how to treat gunshot victims.

Living in the city, we may encounter violence first hand at some time. You are more likely to be a witness to it rather than a victim. Many people who have been in that situation, have had to stand by helplessly as the victim of an accident or attack died while waiting for the

emergency responders to arrive.

This new training is intended to give the victim a "Fighting Chance" to get to the hospital alive. If they get that far, the chance of survival increases dramatically.

Scott Charles and Dr. Tim Bryan came to St. Mark's Church along with a crew of trauma and emergency medicine nurses from Temple University Hospital to teach close to 40 Frankford residents how to handle those situations.

The training lasted two hours with an emphasis on personal safety first. Don't panic These are the first minutes that make all the difference. You remain calm and assess the scene. Is it safe? (Is there still shooting?) Can you go to the victim or would it be better for the victim to come to you, if possible?

The most important thing to do is to stop the bleeding. Learning how to use a shirt or jacket as a tourniquet or turning a person on their side for better breathing can save a life. Being able to keep the scene calm and direct others to get help and make way for an ambulance is also vital for the victim.

There was also a training for Narcan, a prescription medicine used for the treatment of an opioid emergency such as an overdose or a possible opioid overdose with signs of breathing problems and severe sleepiness or not being able to respond.

Zoning

Residents in the area of the **Globe Dye Works at 4520-40 Worth Street** turned out at the Frankford NAC meeting on October 13th to hear about the proposed zoning variance to allow automobile sales in an existing business at the Globe Dye Works.

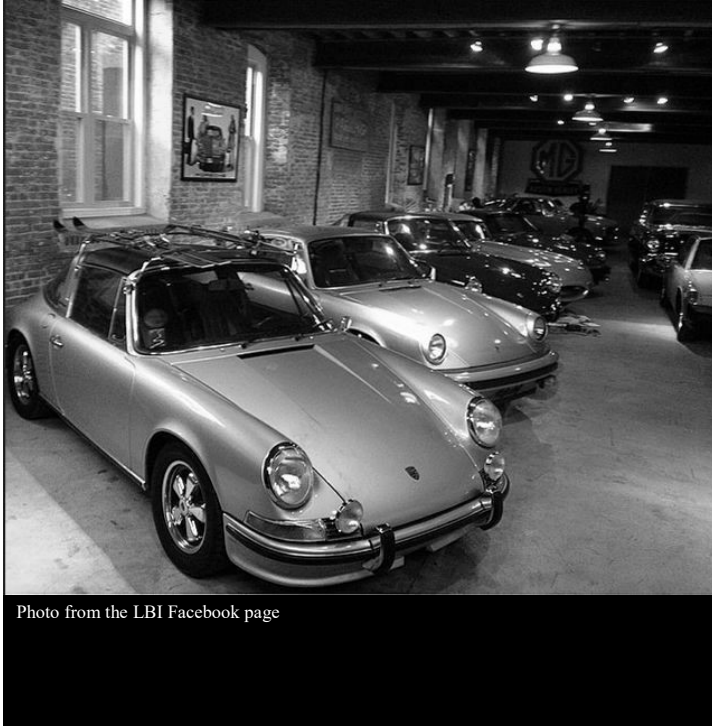

LBI Limited deals in the sale, brokerage, and collection management of investment quality collector cars. They have previously conducted the sales at another location but want to be able to do that at their Globe location in the future. They use the Torresdale side of the Globe building and that would be the entrance where cars are picked up and delivered and provide customer access. The business is not a high volume car lot of the type that presently line Torresdale Avenue

and is completely contained within the building.

Residents raised the issue of parking in the neighborhood and called it a nightmare. They noted that Globe tenants park on Worth and Kinsey Streets and residents have to scramble to park in front of their own house. The Worth Street block captain also raised the issue that the Globe does not give back to the community.

The applicants say there are a small number of customers and their business is entirely on the Torresdale side of the building with occasional access to Worth Street. When the vote was taken, 3 residents attending all opposed the variance.

The owners of **1930 and 1958 Bridge Street** returned to the NAC this month to make their case to convert these single family homes into triplexes. They attended the September meeting but their zon-

ing notices had not been up the required number of days. In the interim they made their presentation to the ZBA. Only 1 resident attending was eligible to vote and he voted in favor of the change.

In the case of **5206 Pennway Street**, the owner needs a variance to legalize an existing fence on his property. He explained his situation and that he did not know that he needed a variance. There were no residents eligible to vote on the case.

A letter will be sent to the ZBA (Zoning Board of Adjustment) informing them of the result of the voting. The ZBA is not obliged to rule in favor of the residents but takes it into account in making a decision. When no residents are eligible to vote, notice of non-opposition is sent.

The next meeting of the Frankford NAC zoning board will be held on November 10th at the Second Baptist Church at 1801 Meadow Street at 7 PM.

The Frankford Avenue Sweep

The community came together to make the point that if you want to do business in Frankford, you have play by the rules. Tuesday, October 18th was a beautiful Fall day to sweep the streets. That is exactly what happened on Frankford Avenue as the Pennsylvania State Police, Philadelphia Health Department and L&I swooped in for inspections on the bars that had complaints filed on them. As of October 20th there were 4 that remained shuttered and others that were cited for various reasons.

This was no accident but the result of a plan put into place several months ago to clean up the Avenue. You can't expect decent businesses to move there with drugs being sold on the sidewalk and the drunk and disorderly crowd making life miserable for the rest of the population.

Thanks to Kim Washington of the Frankford CDC for hosting the meetings and she says "Thank you Councilwoman Sanchez for bringing all the City departments together so that everyone is operating on the same page. Representative Dawkins and Sgt. Clark thank you for jumping right in and making sure State Police played a role in the task force. Bob Smiley thank you for shining a light on some of these issues by writing articles in the Frankford Gazette, and Ken (McDonalds) thanks for making sure the CDC stayed abreast of the numerous events taking place down there. We are extremely grateful for everyone's participation. We hope that we can continue to work together to clean up Frankford Avenue."

The program will continue to bring these businesses into compliance. Other actions are possible now with the passage of the Nuisance Business bill by City Council in June.

There is also a resurgence of civic pride. Residents, faith based organizations and others are joining together and forming coalitions with each other, the police and city agencies for cleaner streets, safer neighborhoods and a better quality of life.

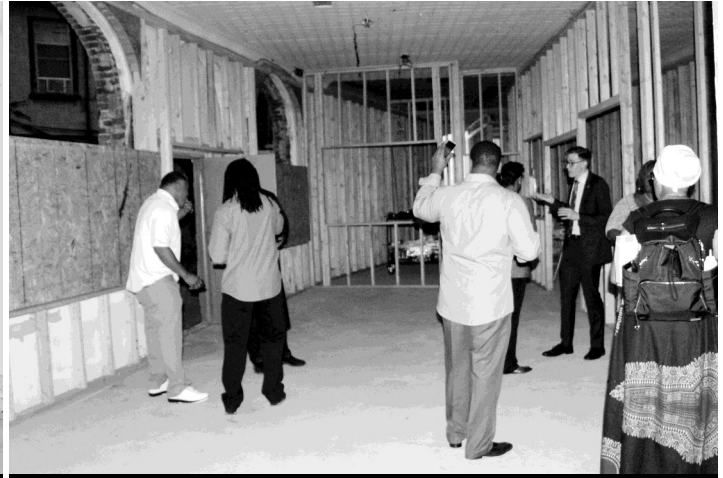

Frankford CDC is Moving to the Doral Building—4667-69 Paul Street

The new office space is for rent at the rear of the building. The CDC will occupy the 2nd floor.

The building will retain the old block façade with tempered glass in a recessed entrance. The old terrazzo tiled entrance will be repaired as well as the stained glass above the entrance door transoms. The showcase windows will be preserved and used as a display for community and café programming. This high tech building will give FCDC a presence on Frankford Avenue, and will serve as a catalyst for revitalization of a major intersection, while allowing the FCDC to grow and build it's capacity for the future.

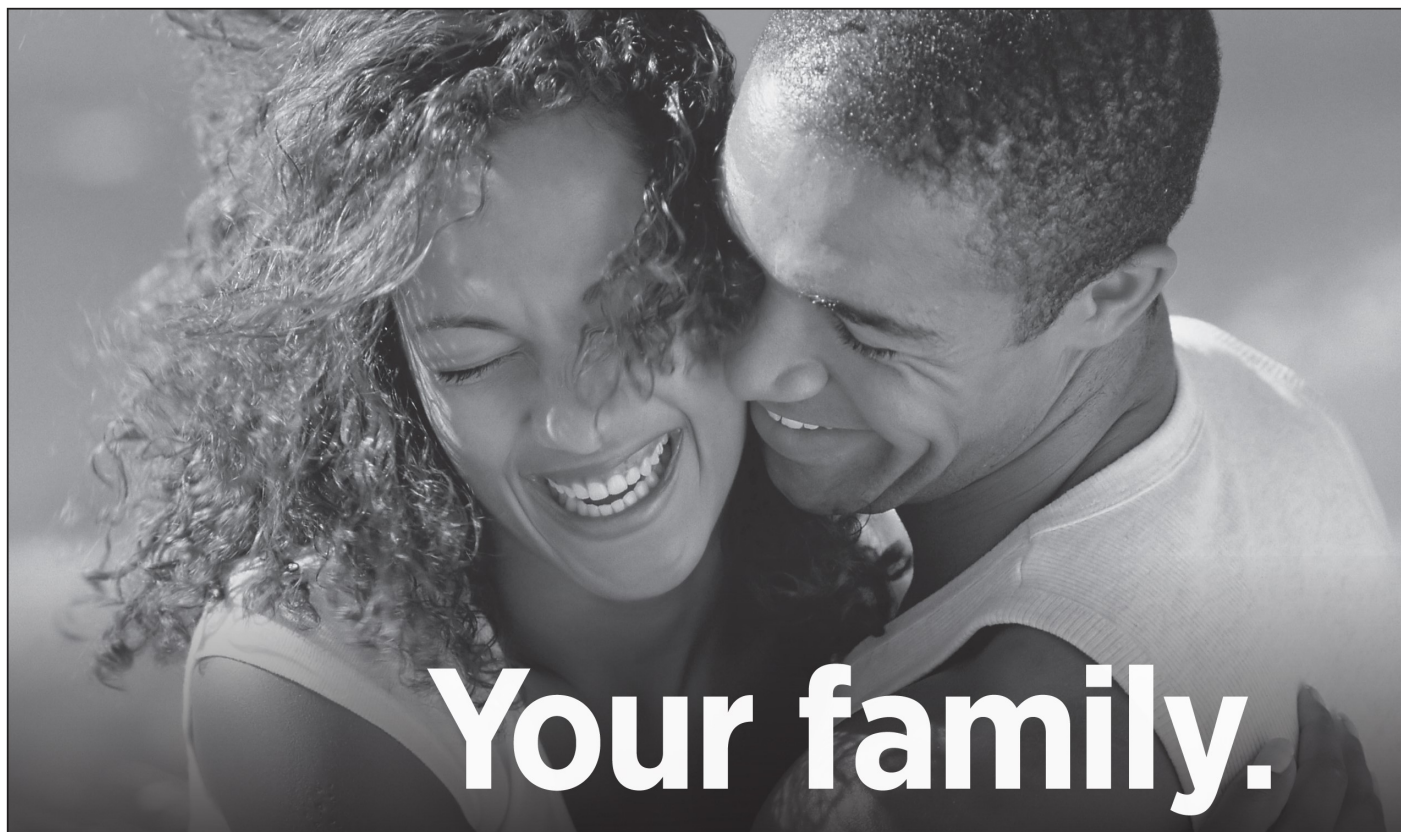
