


Donald Donaldson, Frankford Gazette Veteran of the month for February of 2017, passed away suddenly in late December.

He was born on April 19, 1954 in Anderson, South Carolina the first of the family of 2 boys and 2 girls and was raised on Harrison Street in Frankford where he attended Smedley Elementary, Harding Junior High and Frankford High Schools. He was a long-time member of Northeast Baptist Church.

He enlisted in the United States Marine Corps in 1972 during the Vietnam era. He finished his basic training at Parris Island, South Carolina and served in Japan, Korea and Vietnam. He rose to the rank of E5 (sergeant). Don was honorably discharged in 1976.

Don became a sheet metal worker at Progressor Metal Company. He loved doing community work and volunteering. He began sweeping up on Frankford Avenue because he saw that it was needed, and it was not long before Kim Washington, Executive Director of the Frankford Community Development Corporation, hired him.

Don was an active member of Lloyd C. Wilson American Legion Post 224. He was also a mentor to





many in recovery.

His funeral service was held at the Northeast Baptist Church in Frankford on January 13th where State Representative Jason Dawkins spoke on behalf of the Frankford Community. Post 224 made a presentation to the family.

He is mourned by his family and friends and the entire Frankford Community.


