- The police have been proactive in being present at school dismissal time on the Avenue and where crowds of teens had gathered after dismissal.
- There was a discussion about a recent video posted of a car stop by The driver was 15th. stopped for heavily tinted windows which are illegal. The driver presented evidence from PennDot that he was allowed the tinting due to a medical condition. Some viewers

have labeled the stop as police over reach. Others have called it an attempt by the driver to provoke the police into using excess The discussion force. about the incident was productive.

- Residents from Castor Avenue say that the traffic between Foulkrod and Pratt Streets has become a real problem with noise and speeding. In additions there are ATVs running up and down the streets. Excess noise from a vehicle is an offense punishable with a \$300 fine. Although the police are prohibited from chasing the ATVs for safety reasons, when they are stopped, they can be confiscated and will not be returned. It is illegal to drive them on city Streets.
- Kim Washington, Managing Director of the Frankford CDC, asked about coordination between SEPTA and the PPD regarding the loitering around Margaret-Orthodox. Lt. Gordon noted that this has been a subject at past meetings and SEPTA police have committed to attending the PSA meetings. The schedule confusion this month was the cause of no SEP-TA representation at this months meeting. NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

On Tuesday, May 5, at 6pm, a Public Information Meeting will be held at Frankford Friends Meetinghouse, 1500 Orthodox Street, Philadelphia, to inform the school community and neighborhood about Frankford Friends School's proposed outdoor classroom to be developed on the vacant lot at 1515 Orthodox Street, and about the environmental assessment that has been conducted.

Pursuant to the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act, the act of May 19, 1995, P.L. 4, No. 1995-2, Frankford Friends School submitted to the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection a Notice of Intent to Remediate the site, intended to be used as an outdoor classroom that will include an urban garden using above-ground planting beds, along with a meadow, ornamental plants, shrubs, and trees. The City of Philadelphia has requested that Frankford Friends School develop and implement a public involvement plan for the site. The Site is currently vacant land that was previously occupied by a church for nearly 116 years. Site assessments have indicated that certain polynuclear aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs), which are potentially hazardous substances, are present in surface soil at the site.

An environmental risk assessment conducted by Duffield Associates, a local engineering firm, analyzed the exposure that users of the site will have to the contaminants, based on planned site improvements. The risk assessment found that beyond placing landscape fabric in the bottom of raised bed planters intended for food gardening, no special remediation will be necessary to protect the health of students, teachers, workers, and others who will use the site.

The environmental scientist who conducted the soil testing and risk assessment will present her findings and answer questions from the public at the May 5th meeting. Documents explaining the project, the public involvement plan, and the environmental testing and analysis will be available for public review at the Frankford CDC at 4900 Griscom St, Philadelphia, PA 19124, between the hours of 9:30am and 4:30pm, Monday through Friday.

Written comments about the project from the public will be accepted before and during the public information meeting.
