Project updates rounded out the meeting of the Northwood Civic Association on April 19th with a about 25 residents attending.

Joe Krause, Civic President, says the Conservatorship hearing for the property at 1301 Wakeling Street was held with many residents attending. The judge ordered the owner to do the repairs and get the

residents about their problems.

Gordon ran down a list of statistics for the past 3 weeks. Besides the major crimes which we knew about, we were surprised by the number of truancy and curfew violations. What may appear to be minor issues are of major concern because some of those truants and minors out after hours are the very ones who will be getting into major trouble at some point in the future. The police are continuing to work on the issue.

Bike patrols are targeting the area of the 4700 to 5000 blocks of Frankford Avenue to Penn Street at present. That is where we will be seeing a significant increase in police presence.

Police are aggressively enforcing business hours at night. Those

pant drug activity at Wakeling and Duffield Streets.

Joe Krause, President of the Northwood Civic, complained that they have been trying to address the ad hoc car sales business on the 900 block of Foulkrod Street for 3 years with no success. The City is completely ineffective in dealing with this problem. Cars are parked or moved from place to place all over the neighborhood and nothing gets resolved. Gordon took notes and said he would be looking into it.

Residents from the 4700 block of Griscom reported on the ongoing problem of drug sales and violence on that block. Gordon said this is the area that will be under increased police attention.

house on the market for sale by June 1st or the conservatorship will go to the nonprofit working on behalf of the Northwood Civic. They will then rehab the house and put it up for sale as a single family residence.

This project has been so successful that the Civic is considering conservatorship for several other properties in the same situation.

Terry Heiser gave an update on the traffic improvement to Castor Avenue between Foulkrod and Pratt Streets. The planning is finalized and the job is set to begin. New signage, soft rumble strips, speed limits painted on the roadway all should slow down the traffic and reduce accidents. Heiser notes that he has had great cooperation from the Streets Department we are waiting for the actual work to start.

Now under study is the intersection of Ramona and Adams Avenue because of vehicle and pedestrian traffic. Also residents of the 900 block of Foulkrod complain that it is hard to back out of their driveways with the traffic coming down the street too fast.

Rodney Moore from the Streets Department gave an update on trash issues. Trash should not be put out before 7 PM. Join Recycling Rewards and get free stuff for recycling. To join, call 888-727-2978. Bed bugs are still a big concern to the guys picking up trash. They will pick up mattresses and box springs only if they are wrapped in a plastic bag. If they are not, they will not be picked up and you could be fined for putting them out for pickup improperly. Moore noted that 50 new Trash cops have been hired recently. They will be out enforcing the regulations, so be on guard.

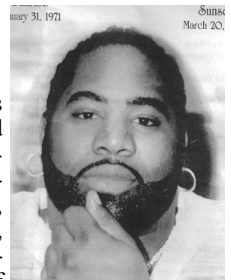
We live in a time when the word hero is over used but he was a hero in the truest sense of the word.

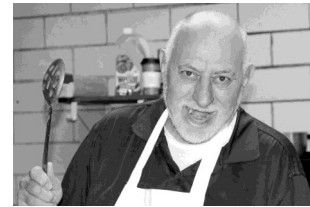

Frankford Stormwater Going Green

On May 17th residents met at McIlvain Playground to hear Haley Stern, Philadelphia Water Outreach Specialist explain the stormwater improvement project planned for Frankford.

These projects are part of Philadelphia's Green City, Clean Waters program. *Green City, Clean Waters* is Philadelphia's plan to reduce stormwater pollution currently entering our Combined Sewer System through the use of green infrastructure.

Green City, Clean Waters represents a major shift in the way we think about and deal with stormwater in Philadelphia. We're recreating the living landscapes that once slowed, filtered, and consumed rainfall by adding green to our streets, sidewalks, roofs, schools, parks, parking lots and more—an impermeable

surface that's currently funneling stormwater into our sewers and waterways is fair game for greening. It's going to take decades of work, but when it's all done, we'll have reduced the stormwater pollution entering our waterways by a stunning 85 percent.

That means rivers and streams that are swimmable, fishable, drinkable on a level exceeding even the memory of Philadelphia's oldest residents.

By employing green tools instead of just relying on traditional infrastructure like pipes and storage basins, we meet standards set by the Clean Water Act while saving Philadelphia an estimated \$5.6 billion. Since *Green City, Clean Waters* was adopted in June 2011, Philadelphia Water and private developers have added over 1,100 green stormwater tools to our landscape.

The plan for Frankford will focus the following streets:

- Sanger St. between Valley St. and Walker St.
- Van Kirk St. and Walker St. intersection
- Cottage Street between Bridge St. and Cheltenham Ave.
- Bridge St. between Walker St. and Cottage St.
- Cottage St. and Harrison St. intersection
- Darrah St. and Allengrove St. intersection
- Duffield St. between Pratt St. and Conklin St.
- Streets surrounding McIlvain Playground (Saul St., Bridge St., Penn St., Pratt St.)

provide a summary of improvements planned for those streets and residents were invited to provide feedback on proposed designs.

A swale, similar to the one put into Womrath Park and recently Harding Middle school, is planned for the cemetery.

Residents from the area of the cemetery expressed concerns about trash and dumping and said they would prefer that the proposed swale there be fenced in. They were told that it would be put into the plan.

The Anti-Violence Committee was fortunate to hear from some of our area Principals about their hopes and concerns for their schools. Principal Michael Calderone, Frankford HS, Principal Jessica Ramos, Stearne ES, Principal Paul Spina, Ziegler ES met with our members at a recent meeting.

Much was shared and beginning relationships formed. Principal Calderone wants to add more specialized academies to prepare students to be able to compete for tomorrow's jobs successfully and he asked us not to judge his students by maybe the few that might make the news. We know him from his days at Harding and he cares about his students and works to get them the best and to bring out their best.

Principal Ramos has been at Stearne ES for 3 years and is in her second year as Principal. Last year, Stearne has gone from being a K-6 school to K-8. While beneficial to the students, it's a big change having 7th & 8th grade students and their

needs are quite different. Her main concern is the number of teacher vacancies. Yet, she continues a strong focus on community, utilizing their "Bulldog" beliefs – safe, respectful, responsible. Socialization for the younger students is also a focus – teaching them how to properly respond to others – the first instinct is to fight.

Principal Ramos' biggest challenge is providing her students with what they need though budgets

have been cut. Principal Ramos was honored at the White House recently for National Teacher Appreciation Day.

Ziegler is another K-8 school and Principal Paul Spina oversees 550 students and many of them are siblings. Resources is one of his biggest needs and he is seeing more students from transitional and very diverse backgrounds, all of whom need more than teaching alone. He sees behavioral and emotional health issues that the school simply can't address.

Partnering with the Vetri Foundation enables his students to experience a weekly family style lunch. The Leader in Me Foundation teaches students leadership skills.

Each Principal has asked for more parental involvement and support from the community. This is crucial for our children, for our students. We've been given an assignment. What grade will you get?

Jim Robson was born in 1935 in Philadelphia with roots in Frankford. He grew up around the 1100 block of Herbert Street and graduated from Frankford High School. He then went on to Penn State where he specialized in horticulture. A year after graduation, Uncle Sam came calling and he was drafted into the Army.

He went to basic training at Fort Dix in New Jersey and Fort Knox in Kentucky and was then assigned to Fort Eustis, Virginia as the company clerk because of his typing skills.

He served two years in the Army and used his leave time and the military transport service to take a 30 day leave to tour Japan. He was honorably discharged and returned home to Philadelphia.

He worked at the Social Security Administration for a total of 20 years which included a 5 year sabbatical in Switzerland to work in a Christian community.

In the early 70s he began to acquire real estate in Frankford. It became a full time business and he now holds a number of properties of various types but all are located in the area around the 1600 block of Wakeling. He still lives in the neighborhood and takes great pride in restoring and maintaining the homes that he owns. He is known for treating his tenants fairly and is an example of what a good landlord should be.
